More from the Reverend Josef A. Jungmann, S.J. about variations on the Kiss of Peace, who below refers to something that still is sometimes used in the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite, namely a *paxbrede*, a full description of which you can find online:

which Father Jungmann calls the *instrumentum pacis* or “instrument of peace”.

According to the statutes of a convent of Cistercian nuns in Lower Germany the Kiss of Peace was given before Communion on Communion days starting with the abess, according to which the server if he or someone else wishes to receive Communion, hands the priest the *instrumentum pacis*, then kisses it himself and passes it on.... According to [other sources] the Cistercians in Germany at the time gave the Pax only at High Mass, whereas the secular clergy imparted it to the server by means of the crucifix also at private Mass. The Pax for the *frater servitor* (or “brother server”) also without Communion was firmly retained in private Mass by the Dominicans.

Elsewhere the kiss of peace gradually became a sort of substitute for Communion. Not only was the kiss exchanged at the altar, but all the people participated. The ancient way of exchanging the kiss of peace would not entail the disturbance and confusion in the service that we would be led to expect today, for then the kiss was not continued from person to person, but merely exchanged between neighbors.

The first Roman ordo says explicitly: When the *Pax Domini* has been spoken, the archdeacon gives the kiss of peace to the first bishop... At the given signal, therefore, those in the nave of the church greeted each other with the kiss. But many of the later manuscripts of this ordo have introduced an inconspicuous but very important change: *deinde ceteris per ordinem et populis*. Thus the kiss of peace is made to proceed from the altar and, like a message or even like a gift which comes from the Sacrament, is handed on “to the others and to the people”.

FROM THE DESK OF THE SEMINARIAN ...

This Thursday, July 28th, marks the thirty-fifth anniversary of the martyrdom of Fr. Stanley Rother, a little known priest who is nonetheless revered in the hearts of many Mount St. Mary's seminarians. As a son of the Mount myself, I would like to share his story.

Stanley Rother was born and raised on a farm in Okarche, Oklahoma. A capable and hard-working farmboy, he nevertheless struggled in many of his school classes. Attentive to the possibility that God was calling him to the priesthood, he entered Assumption Seminary in San Antonio; five and a half years later, he was dismissed for his lack of intellectual ability. Moreover, his diocese was recommended to discontinue Stanley's seminary formation altogether. His bishop, perhaps sensing something of Stanley's holiness, decided to send him instead to Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, MD. After two and half more years of study, Stanley Rother was ordained a priest in 1963.

In 1968, only five years after being ordained a priest, Fr. Rother volunteered to serve at Santiago Atitlán, a mission parish in Guatemala staffed by the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City. In Guatemala, his work-ethic and love for God's flock endeared him to his new parishioners. He quickly found himself, however, embroiled in a hostile environment. Political corruption and civil war among factions greatly affected the poor people of Fr. Rother's village and throughout the country; his Indian parishioners became the victims of kidnappings and terrible tortures. His courageous defense of his innocent flock against the violence perpetrated throughout the country did not go unnoticed by his enemies.

Called back to the States by his bishop because of the threats to his life, Fr. Rother returned to Mount St. Mary's Seminary to make a retreat. During several days of silence, he begged the Lord to reveal His will; return meant almost certain death, unless he grew silent in the face of the injustices. Before returning to Oklahoma, he met with the rector of the seminary, telling him in simple words: "I know what I have to do."

In words which chill me each time I tell his story, Fr. Rother wrote to his bishop: "How can the shepherd run when the sheep are being slaughtered? If it be my fate to die in Guatemala . . . so be it." On July 28, 1981, only months after returning to Santiago Atitlán, Fr. Rother was murdered in his rectory in the middle of the night. The blood-stain on the floor remains, a testament to Fr. Stanley Rother's courage and trust in the Lord. Last summer, the Church declared him a martyr; his canonization could be announced in mere months. He is a patron to Mount priests and seminarians, a contemporary Good Shepherd whose perseverance through discouraging situations won him, finally, the martyr's crown.
